Days 1-4 OKAVANGO DELTA / DUBA PLAINS CAMP

After arriving in Maun, Bostwana (via Johannesburg) on Day 1, you are met and escorted to your scheduled light aircraft flight to Duba Plains Camp, one of the most remote camps in the famed Okavango Delta. The world's largest inland delta, the Okavango Delta is also one of the planet's most magnificent ecosystems. Formed by rivers that spill down from the highlands of Angola and Namibia to spread across the parched sands of the Kalahari, the Okavango offers wildlife a vast oasis. A labyrinth of lakes, lagoons and hidden channels teems with a stunning variety of wild creatures, including 450 species of birds. In what has been called "Earth's Last Eden" crocodiles

slither down papyrus-lined banks, hippos ferry their great bulk through pools, and leopard, lion and cheetah prowl in deadly silence along island paths trampled smooth by herds of elephant and buffalo.

Located on a tree-covered island in a 30,000 acre concession known as the Kwedi Reserve, Duba Plains Camp is a small, intimate camp renowned for its unrivalled access to the titanic struggle for survival between lion and buffalo. The unique landscape, punctuated by palm tree islands, is also home to large herds of elephant, lechwe and pods of hippo. The birdlife is excellent, especially in the Southern hemisphere's summer when all the northern migrants arrive.

With just 6 tents, and a central lounge, dining room and library, this idyllic outpost deep in the Delta, provides the perfect place to relax after the adventure of safari.

DAYS 5-8

PRIVATE SELINDA GAME RESERVE / ZARAFA CAMP

On Day 5, you are transferred by light aircraft to Zarafa Camp, located in the 320,000 acre Selinda Reserve. There are few places in northern Botswana as dynamic as the Selinda Reserve, which is centered on the famous Selinda Spillway, which weaves its way east, linking the far reaches of the Okavango Delta in the south with the Linyanti water systems in the east. It is a truly spectacular and unique landscape.













The view from camp is breathtaking and at the lagoon large pods of hippo gather and crocodiles slide into the water scaring off water birds in great variety and abundance. Elephant are common around Zarafa Camp, with densities during the dry season on a par with those of the Chobe National Park. The open plains are ideal habitat for cheetah while leopard viewing is rewarding when they are encountered. One of Africa's most endangered predators, the Wild Dog, is sometimes encountered in close proximity to the camp. Other common species include: buffalo, giraffe, zebra, wildebeest, hippo, hyena, a variety of antelope including red lechwe, and the chance to spot a number of nocturnal species on night drives.

Synonymous with exclusivity and perfection, Zarafa Camp comes from Dereck and Beverly Joubert, who together designed Zarafa to incorporate all the components of what they envisioned as the ultimate safari camp. It embodies authenticity, luxury and simplicity to create a camp that has been clearly considered, and thoughtfully planned to be as environmentally sensitive as possible. It is the culmination of years of safari experience. Each of the camp's four immense tented suites are raised up on wooden decking and shaded by a canopy of African ebony and Red ivory trees, each with uninterrupted views.

Exploration of this concession, in its immensity, will reveal the pinnacle of conservation, a land restored from the damages of its trophy hunting past and now renewed to its original self, where huge herds of elephant and buffalo roam amongst all three species of big cats as well as the elusive wild dog.

Dr. Chris Brooks was brought up in Kenya, and moved to Botswana in 1998 to work as a professional safari guide. He set up a research program in the Makgadikgadi, studying Botswana's biggest zebra and wildebeest migration, completing his PhD in 2005. As the Integrated Natural Resource Management Coordinator for the Southern Africa Regional Environmental Program (SAREP), Chris continues to supervise a wide variety of projects across northern Botswana. He has extensive knowledge and experience in conducting ecological monitoring and scientific research on range ecology and management, animal behavior, herbivore foraging strategies and has conducted numerous community appraisals within the field of human-wildlife conflict. He is continuing the Makgadikgadi zebra research project and has recently helped to establish a project on Cape buffalo movement within the Delta, while advising PhD research students working on the herbivore guild structure of the Okavango Delta and the foraging ecology of Brown Hyaenas in the Makgadikgadi.

Dr. Hattie Bartlam-Brooks has worked on a number of herbivore projects in the northern Botswana, focusing on improving our understanding of the regulatory factors that control herbivore distribution patterns and how this can be applied to improve conservation practices. She completed her PhD in 2009 and has a particular interest in herbivore migrations. In 2008, she discovered the re-establishment of the second longest zebra migration in Africa. Hattie continues to set-up and supervise a wide variety of applied research projects in northern Botswana. Hattie is the lead researcher of the Okavango Herbivore Research project. She is passionate about increasing our understanding of, and thus our ability to protect, northern Botswana's fragile and unique ecosystems. In 2008 Hattie established the Zebra Migration Project to further investigate the second longest zebra migration in the world that she discovered whilst collecting data on zebra movement in the Okavango.

Dr. Richard Fynn supervises or co-supervises studies running on zebra and buffalo in the Selinda/Linyanti/Savuti region, studies on roan antelope in the Linyanti area, studies on wildebeest in the CKGR and rangeland studies in the Ghanzi region. He will be heading up a big vegetation/habitat mapping project over much of northern Botswana. His key specialization is grazing ecosystem ecology - looking at how the heterogeneity of habitat types in a region determines population productivity for various different herbivore species and how in turn the herbivores affect the productivity and quality of their resource base.

Dr. Sven Bourquin earned his PhD in Conservation Ecology from the University of Stellenbosch with his thesis focused on the Nile crocodile in the panhandle of the Okavango Delta. His experience includes a position as an Environmental Consultant for Dibatana Research and Monitoring Camp in Botswana. He also conducted a number of vegetation surveys as part of a program aimed at assessing the impact and change of diet of relocated elephants. These surveys were conducted in reserves in South Africa and included a diverse range of habitat types including savannah bushveld, dune forest, floodplain, sand forest, swamp forest and riverine forest.
